Reflections on Parts of the Mass

Ambo

Ambo, lectern, pulpit—it goes by many names but it serves one purpose, to mount the Liturgy of the Word. In some denominations, the ambo dominates the worship space. Because the Bible alone governs their system of belief, they give its proclamation primacy of place in the arrangement of the sanctuary.

In Catholic churches, the altar typically dominates the sanctuary because our tradition has emphasized the Eucharist as the climax of our worship. However, this worthy emphasis sometimes caused us to slight the role of the Word of God, and our ambos have suffered from sapless designs and insignificant placement. For centuries, the priest used to read the Scriptures himself at the altar. Altars had an "Epistle side" and a "Gospel side." Now the Scriptures have their own place, the ambo. (In Greek, the word originally referred to a platform or stage.)

The ambo's specific purpose provides a place for the Scriptures, the Responsorial Psalm and the Easter Proclamation (the Exsultet, proclaimed once a year, only at the Easter Vigil). It may also be used for the Homily and the Universal Prayer (the Prayer of the Faithful). But that's it! It is not the place for announcements, for the priest's opening prayer or remarks, for the soloist at the wedding, or the folk choir—unless, of course, they're leading the Responsorial Psalm. The priest should pray from his chair, and the songs and announcements belong at a stand in a different location. We reserve the ambo for the word of God.

Consequently, the ambo should look special. It enjoys a fixed place in the sanctuary, not a portable status subject to removal or displacement. Too often, we obscure the ambo with decorations and banners, as if it were merely a hook for hanging pictures rather than the home for the word of God. It demands dignity of place, room for candles if desired, and a location where all can see and hear the reader. Microphones of good quality are essential in most churches. A church's best mikes belong with the Scriptures, not just with the musicians.

The ambo is the primary place from which we hear the Word of God and it deserves our sacred respect.





Modern St. Augustine spreads revolutionary street evangelization ministry

Why would anyone do street evangelization, sharing the Gospel with strangers in public? Understand why with Steve Dawson's story.

There is something endlessly compelling about a "prodigal son" story, and the story of Steve Dawson, founder of St. Paul Street Evangelization, recalls unforgettable converts like St. Augustine or St. Paul.

After chasing all the glittering promises the world has to offer, Dawson found them to be empty show. His pursuit of pleasure led him to the life-changing moment he shares in his recent call-to-arms memoir, <u>Catholic Evangelization: Stories of Conversion and Witness</u>:

I hit rock bottom. I was sick of my empty life... I couldn't go on living like this. It was then that I made a challenge to an unknown God, the last-ditch effort of a man whose self-styled life was not working. I remember kneeling in my parents' backyard, letting the wetness of the grass seep through my jeans. I set down my bottle of Jack Daniel's, looked up at the sky, and prayed the first real prayer I had ever prayed: *God, if You're real, You'll have to show me.*

This first honest prayer led him on an intense journey of discovery, until, he writes, "Much to my chagrin, the religion I *didn't* want to be true, the one my mom always seemed to be pushing on me, turned out to be the goal of my intellectual search." Against all odds, Dawson not only became Catholic but also founded a street evangelization ministry that spread like wildfire around the globe.

Awe-inspiring stories

Today <u>St. Paul Street Evangelization</u> is an international apostolate that has grown to hundreds of teams in seven countries in just a few years. How did Dawson go from a lifestyle of drinking, drugs, and hedonism to founding his hugely successful street evangelization ministry? This dramatic story forms the first part of Dawson's can't-put-it-down book. And then, after his own story, we get to enjoy and wonder at powerful stories of conversion and witness from other street evangelists.

The storytellers are ordinary Catholics who have come to love Christ so much that now they talk about Him with total strangers in public places—street corners, parks, and shopping areas. They aren't theologians or highly trained apologists, yet their simple missionary efforts have yielded amazing results.

The joy of sharing Good News

The book's easy conversational style shows how all of us baptized Christians are called to be missionaries. And their stories reveal the joy and fulfillment that come from sharing the good news of God's mercy. Some of these stories can hardly be believed, like that of the inner-city Chicago gang leader who survived nine gunshots, then turned his life around to serve as street evangelist to the men who shot him. The witness of his life and many others in the world of St. Paul Street Evangelization reveal the wild power of God's grace and mercy. Why would anyone do street evangelization, sharing the Gospel with complete strangers in the public square? How do street evangelists even pull off this ministry, and with such amazing success? You'll understand after reading

Priest hopes to inspire after his "Jeopardy!" appearance

Fr. Steve Jakubowski garnered a number of fans when he put his knowledge to the test.

Viewers were slightly stunned to see a Catholic priest on September 19th's episode of *Jeopardy!* While fans of the show couldn't help but share their delight at seeing Fr. Steve Jakubowski in his Roman collar -- with comments on social media directed at his physical attributes -- others were more impressed by his theological knowledge, with one person on X commenting that the parochial vicar at St. Ignatius Martyr Catholic Church in Austin, Texas "killed it" with his replies to the religious questions.

Unfortunately for the religious contestant, his answer in the final round about Frank Sinatra, which saw him risk \$5,301, was incorrect and he left the show with \$99. (If you're curious, the question was: Frank Sinatra got upset that a photo of him caught fire in a Brooklyn pizzeria in this film." The priest guessed God Father II.)

However, Fr. Jakubowski <u>explained to Fox News Digital</u> that it was a "great experience." Furthermore, he hopes it can serve a meaningful purpose:

Ken and all the producers and team were very kind to me with the novelty of having a Catholic priest on the show. I hope it gave a positive impression of my community and the Church. The show airs at 3:30 where I live in Austin, and so we had a watch party at our parish school with our students and their parents -- tons of fun to share that with our parish."

Interestingly his appearance on the gameshow that was first released 60 years ago, did encourage discussions other than his looks! As some people pointed out, ordinarily the host Ken Jennings refers to people by their first name, however, with the clergyman he continually referred to him as "Father Steve." This gesture of respect led to a discussion on the show's Reddit page on the use of honorifics for contestants. While some people felt it was a little confusing to go against the show's seemingly usual policy, someone did point out that Fr. Steve was "wearing his profession on his sleeve."
