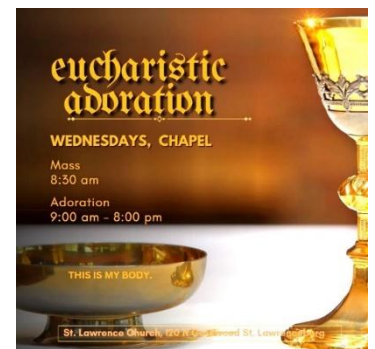

# Spiritual Directions

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## Is it ever a good thing to speak badly about another person?

*Sometimes we can fall into the trap of calling people names, or posting nasty social media posts about a person, claiming that we are only telling the truth.*

When living in a polarized world, it is tempting to be overly defensive of our particular viewpoint. What happens is that when we see someone on the "other" side doing something we think is wrong, we are tempted to drag them in the dirt publicly.

In the social media age, this means that we rush to post a nasty comment on our favorite platform, telling the whole world how terrible the other person is. We often do this, not only because we feel that we are justified, but because we think it is the "Christian" thing to do. Didn't Jesus call the Pharisees names? Isn't it a Christian thing to "tell the truth"? While we may think that we are serving God while pulling someone else down, we are actually doing the opposite.

### Three murders

St. Francis de Sales believed that publicly destroying a person's name was never a good idea. He explains in his *Introduction to the Devout Life*, how it commits "three murders":

"The slanderer commits three several murders with his idle tongue: he destroys his own soul and that of him who hearkens, as well as causing civil death to the object of his slander; for, as St. Bernard says, the Devil has possession both of the slanderer and of those who listen to him, of the tongue of the one, the ear of the other...Aristotle says that, like the forked, two-edged tongue of the serpent, so is that of the slanderer, who at one dart pricks and poisons the ear of those who hear him, and the reputation of him who is slandered."

Slander, for St. Francis de Sales, was not only disclosing untrue statements, but also true ones.

"My daughter, I entreat you never speak evil of any, either directly or indirectly; beware of ever unjustly imputing sins or faults to your neighbor, of needlessly disclosing his real faults, of exaggerating such as are overt, of attributing wrong motives to good actions, of denying the good that you know to exist in another, of maliciously concealing it, or depreciating it in conversation. In all and each of these ways you grievously offend God, although the worst is false accusation, or denying the truth to your neighbor's damage, since therein you combine his harm with falsehood."

We may think that we are serving God by telling the world the truth about someone, but when we do such a thing with an evil intent, we cancel out any good it could have done.

Certainly at times we need to speak the truth, but the appropriate sequence should be to first confront the person, instead of publicly proclaiming their faults for all to see. We need to keep in mind that we are not God, and that we do not always know the full picture. It is much better to handle things offline, in a more personal way, than by trying to show someone their wrongdoing by posting it in a public setting.

Above all we should pray for those we detest, loving our enemies as Christ has asked us to do.

## How to cure our quick judgments of other people

*It is too easy sometimes to be quick to judgment, seeing what someone did and immediately thinking they are a terrible person and our enemy.*

How often do you see someone, whether it is in person or online, and immediately jump to conclusions? This temptation is especially present on social media, where we see a news headline, or see a photo on Instagram and immediately characterize a person or group of people. Often this will include marking someone as our enemy, based on something they did, or on what they shared on social media.

We also run the risk of making quick judgments whenever we go to Mass. We'll see someone and what they are wearing, and instantly assume something ill of them. Or we may get annoyed by someone's children making a racket at Mass and immediately condemn them as bad parents. Making hasty judgments is never a good thing and it is a vice we will need to correct.

### The cure

In addition to frequent confession, St. Francis de Sales provides a cure in his *Introduction to the Devout Life*. He explains that love is the cure to quick judgments:

"What remedy can we apply?...Drink freely of the sacred wine of love, and it will cure you of the evil tempers which lead you to these perverse judgments. So far from seeking out that which is evil, Love dreads meeting with it, and when such meeting is unavoidable, she shuts her eyes at the first symptom, and then in her holy simplicity she questions whether it were not merely a fantastic shadow which crossed her path rather than sin itself."

He goes so far as to compare rash judgments to a spiritual "jaundice": "Most assuredly the sin of rash judgments is a spiritual jaundice, which makes everything look amiss to those who have it; and he who would be cured of this malady must not be content with applying remedies to his eyes or his intellect, he must attack it through the affections, which are as the soul's feet. If your affections are warm and tender, your judgment will not be harsh; if they are loving, your judgment will be the same."

St. Francis de Sales even goes so far as to say, "Are we never, then, to judge our neighbor? you ask. Never, my child. It is God Who judges criminals brought before a court of law." God did not appoint us as a judge, ready to pronounce our own view of people's actions. Only God knows the secrets of our hearts and this knowledge should spark within us compassion and love of other people.

Don't we want others to have a similar view of us? Don't we want other people to deal with us leniently, not judging our actions?

Our job on earth is not to deal out sentences, but only to have compassion on our enemies and to pray for them. They certainly may have done something wrong, and we can at times speak against it; but we should never condemn them. God is the one who judges and deals out sentences.

We are not God.

## Interesting Catholic News

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### How St. Bernadette tested her vision to see if it was demonic

*Not knowing at first whether the Lady dressed in white was good, St. Bernadette approached her vision cautiously, testing the vision in a variety of ways.*

Interestingly enough, St. Bernadette did not know she was seeing the Blessed Virgin Mary when the apparitions began. All she knew was that she saw a beautiful young lady dressed in white, with a blue sash around her waist. St. Bernadette's parents and siblings were even more skeptical, thinking that the lady was a soul from purgatory, or possibly a demon. The next time they visited the grotto, St. Bernadette and her siblings were prepared to test the vision.

#### Holy water

One of the first tests St. Bernadette performed was sprinkling the vision with holy water.

The 1872 book *Our Lady of Lourdes* recounts this first test, which happened the next time St. Bernadette saw Our Lady:

The little girls only perceived the desert rock and the branches of sweet briar which descended...where Bernadette contemplated an unknown being. Nevertheless, the countenance of Bernadette was such that there were no means of doubting. One of the children placed the bottle of holy water in the hands of her who saw.

St. Bernadette then approached the vision and armed herself with the holy water. Then Bernadette remembering what she had promised, arose and shaking, quickly and with several repetitions, the little bottle sprinkled the wonderful lady, who quite graciously remained at some paces before her in the interior of the niche. St. Bernadette then said, "If you come on the part of God, approach."

Our Lady "bowed several times and advanced almost to the end of the rock. She seemed to smile at the precautions of Bernadette and at her weapons of war and at the sacred name of God her countenance lighted up." Still slightly afraid, St. Bernadette proclaimed, "If you come on the part of the devil, begone."

Our Lady did not leave until St. Bernadette finished praying her Rosary. Eventually St. Bernadette would ask the Lady what her name was, and she answered, "I am the Immaculate Conception."

This was the final confirmation for St. Bernadette that the Lady she saw was not a demon, but the Blessed Virgin Mary.

## Is Ash Wednesday the latest it can be this year?

*Ash Wednesday is on March 5 this year, but that is not the latest date that Lent can begin.*

Typically when we get over halfway through February we are already in the midst of Lent.

Ash Wednesday in particular always seems to be celebrated during February. In fact, often Ash Wednesday falls on Valentine's Day, changing the mood of an otherwise celebratory day. Yet this year (2025), Ash Wednesday is not celebrated during February at all. It is celebrated on March 5, which is one of the latest dates it can fall on.

## How is Ash Wednesday calculated?

Originally Lent wasn't always 40 days, as it first started out as only a few days of fasting and in some cases, a mere 40 hours of preparation before Easter. Later the Church adopted a tradition of 36 days of fasting, representing a "tenth" of the calendar year.

According to the norms established by the Council of Nicaea (325) and later adopted for Western Christianity at the Synod of Whitby, Easter Sunday falls each year on the first Sunday following the first full moon after the vernal equinox.

This calculation is different than many Orthodox Christians' dating of Easter. Fr. Jon Magoulias at the Greek Reporter explains that the Orthodox calculation of Easter differs from the rest of Christianity is because the "Orthodox Church continues to follow the Julian calendar when calculating the date of Pascha (Easter). The rest of Christianity uses the Gregorian calendar. There is a 13-day difference between the two calendars, the Julian calendar being thirteen (13) days behind the Gregorian." Furthermore, for Western Christianity Lent is composed of 46 total days.

## But why 46? I thought Lent commemorated Jesus' "40 days" in the desert.

The six Sundays in Lent are not considered part of the official Lenten fast (every Sunday is a special remembrance of the Resurrection of Christ), and so if you subtract six from 46, you get the full 40 days of Lent.

## What is the latest date Lent can start?

The latest date Lent can start is March 10, with Easter being celebrated on April 25.

This year Ash Wednesday is on March 5, with Easter falling on April 20. It may not be the latest dates, but it is only five days away from being the latest it can be.

February without Lent may seem a bit odd, but in a certain sense it can provide a greater space between the season of Christmas and Lent, giving us a bit more time to prepare.

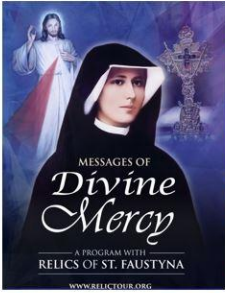
